



Elsa Dixon - School Based Trainee Scholarships



Congratulations to Chris Barden and Bailey Newman who were both successful in being awarded a School Based Traineeship funded by the Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Grant to complete as part of their HSC. Chris will complete a Certificate III in Educational Support employed by the school and Bailey will complete a Certificate II in Agriculture employed locally. Both Chris and Bailey were required to complete a three-page application form, resume and attend a formal job interview with three panel members via Zoom. Scholarships were highly contested across the State with many applicants. The work that both students put into their applications and interview preparations was highly commended! To fulfil the requirements Chris and Bailey must:

- Complete 100 days paid employment
- Complete their nationally recognised qualifications
- Complete years 11 and 12

VALID Tests

The Validation of Assessment for Learning and Individual Development (VALID) program provides online end-of-stage assessments for the science key learning area. These assessments can be used as a diagnostic tool to assist in improving student outcomes in science and as a tool for program evaluation. The test is linked to the science syllabuses, and assesses what students know and can do in science. It also provides useful information about student attitudes towards science.

Three assessments packages are offered:

VALID Science & Technology 6 and VALID Science 10

These tests are optional for schools with Year 6 and year 10 students. Schools with students in Year 6 and Year 10 can participate by registering their full cohort. Teachers of the registered schools will participate in five hours of NESA registered professional learning and then mark the extended response tasks for their school

VALID Science 8

This test is mandatory for NSW government schools and optional for non-government schools. Tests are marked externally.

Collarenebri Year 6 and 10 students have already completed the non-mandatory tests for 2020 and the results will be available in term 4


All students in Years 5/6 have increased in their reading levels, this was one of our focused areas for this year and will continue to be next term.

During Mathematics we have been learning about **Square and Triangular Numbers**. At triangular number counts objects arranged in an Equilateral Triangle. Triangular numbers are a type of figurate numbers, another example being square numbers. At Triangular number is the number of dots in the triangular arrangement with dots on a side, middle and is equal to the sum of the dots combined.

A Square number or perfect square is a number that is the square of an integer; in other words, it is the product of some integer with itself. For example, 9 is a Square number,

Gamilaraary Language LOTE

Again, last week students have been busy in their Gamilaraay Language class with Miss Melissa and Mr Hynch learning about the Turtle Calendar used by our Nation's First People and Indigenous people of the world.

The turtle story learnt students how days, months, and moon cycles planed yearly living cycles for Aboriginal People.

In today's world the turtle calendar is kind of the same except, the turtle calendar has 28 days per month, 13 months per year and 364 days per year, were in today's calendar year we have up to 31 days per month, 12 months a year and 365 days per year.

If you look closely to a real turtle's shell you will be able to count 28 squares around the shell these represent 28 days in a month.

In the middle are the 13 months per year.

Moon cycles mean, it takes 28 days - roughly about a month for the moon to circle the earth.

Aboriginal People learnt seasons by taking notice of the animals, plants, water seas and the change in weather.

Aboriginal People used the turtle shell to map out the year ahead and to look for certain food sources in that particular time of the year.


Students had fun decorating and making their turtle calendar, also touching and counting squares on the real little turtle shell. Turtle in Gamilaraay language is – ("waraba" for short-necked turtle) & ("girrabirrii" for long-necked turtle).









Students done a fantastic job completing their survey as this was part of their LOTE and science element of the excursion.


















Making Shrimp Buckets




LOTE – Language Class
